you believe that you are wonderfully made by God? Do you believe that you are who you are supposed to be because God has made you that way?

We will believe that God has made us good and live with fear and wonder at what he has made, only if we believe that God himself is good. Our God is a good and wise Creator. He is an intentional and purposeful Creator. Which means he was very intentional and purposeful when he made you the way that you are — with your unique strengths and weaknesses. The Creator did not have to make you or me the way that he did, but he did so out of his love and goodness. God does not make mistakes. He always knows what he is doing and has a purpose for every moment of your life as he does for everyone that you know. Ephesians 2:10 says, "...we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." Do you hear how purposeful God is? We are created on purpose, with purpose and for purpose. Though we will never stop fighting sin and growing in the likeness of Jesus, we are exactly who we are supposed to be.

Thoughts like this were conveyed with humor and power by Dr. Kathy Koch in her talk "How God Made Us Good" during the Colson Center's Wilberforce Weekend. We are going to watch this talk, along with several others, on Saturday, October 23 at the church. The speakers are engaging, and the topic is critically important for us to remember. We need to understand and rejoice in who we are and why we are as human beings. It effects the way we think about everyone and everything else around us.

In The Nature of True Virtue, one of the most profound treatises on social ethics ever written, Jonathan Edwards lays out how sin destroys the social fabric. He argues that human society is deeply fragmented when anything but God is our highest love...

If we get our very identity, our sense of worth, from our political position, then politics is not really about politics, it is about us. Through our cause we are getting a self, our worth. That means we must despise and demonize the opposition. If we get our identity from our ethnicity or socioeconomic status, then we have to feel superior to those of other classes and races. If you are profoundly proud of being an open-minded, tolerant soul, you will be extremely indignant toward people you think are bigots. If you are a very moral person, you will feel very superior to people you think are licentious. And so on.

The more we love and identify deeply with our family, our class, our race, or our religion, the harder it is to not feel superior or even hostile to other religions, races, etc. So racism, classism, and sexism are not matters of ignorance or a lack of education. The real culture war is taking place inside our own disordered hearts, wracked by inordinate desires for things that control us, that lead us to feel superior and exclude those without them, and that fail to satisfy us even when we get them.

...Edwards concludes that only if God is our summum bonum, our ultimate good and life center, will we find our heart drawn out not only to people of all families, races, and classes, but to the whole world in general.

The Annotated Hymnal

"All People That on Earth Do Dwell" by William Kethe

his is often called "The Old Hundredth" because it is based on Psalm 100. It is probably the oldest hymn of praise in the English language. William Kethe, a Scotsman, was a minister of the Church of England. But during the reign of Queen Mary, which was a reign of terror for many English Protestants, Kethe fled to Germany and then to Geneva, Switzerland. In Geneva he was influenced by John Calvin. There he assisted in the translation of the Geneva Bible and helped to produce a complete English version of the metrical psalms. From this Psalter, now more than four hundred years old, "The Old Hundredth" is taken. The hymn was first published in London in 1561, shortly after Queen Elizabeth I came to the throne.

The music was written by John Calvin's choir director, and the hymn has never been set to any other but the original tune.

Scriptures: Psalm 100:1–4; John 10:11; Hebrews 13:15

All people that on earth do dwell, Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice; Him serve with fear, His praise forth tell; Come ye before Him and rejoice.

The Lord, you know, is God indeed; Without our aid He did us make; We are His flock, He doth us feed, And for His sheep He doth us take.

O enter then His gates with praise; Approach with joy His courts unto; Praise, laud and bless His name always, For it is seemly so to do.

For why? The Lord our God is good, His mercy is forever sure; His truth at all times firmly stood, And shall from age to age endure.

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
