
Our Mission

The Pastor's Column

"To Know Him Better"

For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all the saints, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better.

Ephesians 1:15-17 (NIV84)

Who doesn't want to know God better? If I was a citizen of Ephesus reading this letter, I would be so grateful to Paul for praying that I would "know God better." However, if you were to come up to me on the street and ask, "What can I pray for?", my first response would not be, "Pray that I would now God better."

Responding to the question, I would share some physical or emotional struggle that my family is experiencing. "Pray for my daughter because she's going to need

surgery someone in the next couple of years." Selflessly, I would ask for prayers for my children. "Please pray for my kids as they adjust to a new school." If you gave me enough time, I may share some more personal requests. "Please pray for our marriage, for decisions regarding the future, for our fears and anxieties." Eventually, I may you to pray for others. Although I do desire to know him better, I don't believe that would be a primary request of mine.

In a similar way, I desire to know my wife better. I really would. Although we will celebrate our tenth anniversary this year, I still don't know her perfectly. Slothfully, I feel like I know her "well enough." Raising four young children, managing schedules, and maintaining other relationships makes knowing her better elusive. I know her well enough to have an intimate relationship with her. If we are not diligent, the intimacy we share stagnates. Knowing each other better can take the backseat to knowing each other enough to get by in life.

I haven't taken a poll, but I have a strong sense that this is true with most marriages. Spouses arrive at a point of knowledge of their significant other that is "enough." The relationship lumbers onward, neither growing nor dying. It simply exists.

Seima and Naoko Aoyagi Mission to the World (MTW) — Tokyo, Japan



Seima Aoyagi was born in Japan and grew up in a typical Buddhist family without any Christian influence. A Christian friend in high school led him to Christ. Naoko grew up with a Christian father who took her to church. Given this rare chance to grow up in church, Naoko came to faith during middle school. With two kids, Seima and Naoko came to Covenant Seminary in St Louis and Seima received his M.Div. in 2008. After being ordained in the PCA in 2009, Seima was called to go back to Japan to be involved in a church plant movement in Tokyo, one of the largest and fastest growing cities in the world with 35 million people, yet with one of the smallest Christian presence of 0.22%. The ministry is a collaborative work of MTW and Redeemer PCA in NY and is an attempt to start a movement that produces churches that are gospel-centered, grace-based, and missional in nature. Seima and Naoko have four children: Senri, Towa, Satoki, and Akari. Last April, Towa fell on his neck and lost mobility of both arms and legs. He is making tremendous improvement but still

has no movement in his right fingers. Towa is finally back home after months in the hospital and Rehab Center! His main rehab is now through his daily activities, but he also continues to go to the Rehab Center for additional therapy.

Seima's responsibilities include Church planting, pastoring, teaching, and mentoring. In January of 2014, Grace Harbor Church started a monthly worship service which became twice a month in May of that year. They had a steady local attendance with about 40 adults and 10 kids, including 10 adults and 5 kids who are non-Christians. On Easter Sunday 2015, they began weekly services and had about 20 adults become members of the church. This past December, they had their first Christmas service. Seima said, "It was my humble joy to see 111 people came to our Christmas service and 23 of them were non-Christians. But what made me so excited was that I was able to baptize two wonderful ladies."

Donna answered the alter call at a gospel music concert 12 years ago. But she was not connected to a church and her faith faded away. After experiencing the great earthquake in 2011, she became afraid how she could protect her kids if there was another earthquake. In searching for peace, she noticed that she should come back to her faith again. Just about the time they started weekly worship service, Donna started to attend Grace Harbor Church, and her faith grew from an inch deep to a mile. Seima says, "It was my joy to go through Bible study and baptism class with her and see her growth. The testimony she gave on that Christmas Sunday encouraged many other non-Christian moms who also are filled with unspoken worry about raising kids.

Miwa first experienced Christian community when she was studying in the US at a Christian university. She became interested in and even was wanting to become a Christian, but the lightning bolt experience she was looking for never happened to her when she was in States. As she started to attend Grace Harbor Church, she came to understand that how God calls could be different from person to person, and God has been faithfully leading her to the faith even it was gradual process. In her testimony, she was encouraging other non-Christians there to notice a possible slight work of the Holy Spirit calling them to Christian faith.

Seima wants to let you know that because of your support and prayer, these ladies have found a spiritual home. God's kingdom in Japan, even it is slow, is expanding.

Grace Harbor has a vision to open another worship site in the next neighborhood, called Tsukishima (where the Aoyagis live). They had their first Christmas Eve service there in December. Even though it was Thursday night, a normal work day, a lot of Japanese came from the local community. They had lessons and carols with the organ and violin. The place was filled with about 100 people, and many said that the service was touching. To Seima, the highlight was when Towa stood and read scripture with a strong voice even with a weak leg.

- That our family be dependent on the Lord more and more.
- For Grace Harbor Church as we are in the process of reformatting our small groups.
- For new contacts through outreach events that we would keep our friendship and be able to introduce Jesus to them.
- For our new church that we not only grow in number but also in maturity as followers of Christ.
- Pray that we help their growth through community groups and discipleship meetings.
- For me as a pastor that I can lead in a godly manner
- For more church planting happening in Tokyo, the world largest city—yet with only 0.2% Christians!

Does this sound like your relationship with God? If you were to describe your relationship with God to a fellow Christian, would the most honest description be "It exists."? Wouldn't you love to be able to say that you know God and that you are getting to know him better?

How do we really come to know God better? Incredibly, God reveals himself to us, he does this through his Word. In allowing us to know him, he could have simply dropped a book from heaven as some religions believe. Borrowing a modern phrase, he could have just downloaded the information about him into our minds. He chose a different approach. In his generosity and kindness, he didn't choose to give us mere information regarding himself. He chose to give us his very self in relationship.

My wife and I seek to carve out specific time so we can know each other better (or just to get a much-needed break!). If we did not, our intimacy becomes elusive. We come to know God better through his Word, his Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ. As we read the words of Scripture, we know God better because we can see the gospel of Jesus from the Old Testament to the New Testament. When God's Word is read, when God's Word is preached, when God's Word is meditated upon, we may know God better. And this is not merely and intellectual knowledge. It is a relational knowledge. It is personal. It is intimate.

I encourage you to pray pray for each other using the prayer of Paul for the Ephesians. Pray that you would know God better. Pray your spouse and children would know him better. Even pray your enemies would know him better. For when we know him better, we see him as he really is, the "glorious Father." (Ephesians 1:17)

"God is the highest good of the reasonable creature, and the enjoyment of him is the only happiness with which our souls can be satisfied. To go to heaven fully to enjoy God is infinitely better than the most pleasant accommodations here. Fathers and mothers, husbands, wives, children, or the company of earthly friends, are but shadows. 

RYM Youth Leader Training and Summer Conferences

We have 10 students signed up to attend RYM Summer Conferences this year! This is double the number we sent last year! At this rate, we will have a group of 320 students attending in 5 years...pretty amazing, right???

In all seriousness, it's exciting to see more of our students getting involved in these conferences. This past January, I was able to attend my second year of RYM Youth Leader Training (YLT) in Nashville. YLT (photos below) offers training in a number of topics, but a majority of the training is devoted to RYM's philosophy of ministry (POM), which helps give youth leaders a grid to think through youth ministry. It's difficult to condense an entire week's worth of content into a single newsletter article, so my hope is to progress through the RYM POM in future newsletters. The RYM POM is beneficial not only to youth leaders, but to teachers and parents of children of any age, as well as adults. My prayer is that in the coming months these articles will help you think through your own philosophy of ministry and how you can better reach people for Christ and equip them to serve.

As for our students, it's not too early to begin praying for them as they prepare for these conferences. I'm excited about this year's theme of "The Church," which will hopefully reinforce some ideas for our study last fall (and probably fill in the many gaps that I left!). My hope is for our students to cultivate a Christ-like love for the church and take ownership of their role in the covenant community.

Our conferences this year are located in Panama City Beach, FL and Hawkins, TX. That's nearly 1,000 miles worth of travel between the two. We have worked to keep the transportation costs to a minimum, but we need your help! To help our students raise funds to cover our travel expenses, we will be serving a *Chipotle*-style build-your-own Tex-Mex fiesta lunch during our monthly Fellowship Meal on Sunday, June 12th. Our goal is to raise \$500, with a suggested donation of \$20 per family. The Annotated Hymnal

"Christ Is Risen" by Matt Maher from the album "Alive Again"

"O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?"

-1 Corinthians 15:55

"Let no one caught in sin remain inside the lie of inward shame." Our tendency as broken creatures is to conceal our shame. Light exposes us. After the first sin of Adam and Eve, their reaction was one of shame. They had been exposed, as it were, and being exposed is painful. In our pride, we are often reluctant to admit our faults. This sin of pride allows our inward shame to grow and fester. Sin has a vicious cycle about it. So how are we to respond? Maher addresses this in verse one: we are to "fix our eyes upon the cross." Scottish pastor Robert Murray McCheyne once wrote, "For every look at



yourself, take ten looks at Christ." Verse 1 ends by showing us this Christ in his humiliation, wherein he empties himself of his glory, takes on the form of a servant, and lovingly sacrifices himself for his people (WLC 46).

But the story doesn't end there! The chorus points us to a reality that we celebrate every Lord's Day: Christ is risen from the dead! There are many theological and practical implications that can be drawn from this, but I'll focus on just one for now: Christ's resurrection assures us of our own resurrection from the dead in the last day (WLC 52). Because Christ has paid our debt, imputed his perfect obedience to us, and is interceding for us even now, we can have the certain hope of resurrection in the last day.

Speaking of Christ's perfect obedience, verse two reminds us of his submission to his Father's will. Christ submitted to his Father's will not only in his death, but also in his life. He subjected himself to the law, and when all was said and done, he had perfectly fulfilled it. I was recently at a meeting where someone asked the question, "Are we saved by works?" Everyone's initial reaction was to say, "Of course not! We're saved by grace through faith!" While this is certainly true, we are, in a sense, ultimately saved by works. Notice I didn't say *our* works. Rather, the completed work of Christ's perfect obedience is given to us as we receive it by grace through faith. The command of Christ still stands: "Be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5:48). However, this is something we are unable to do in our own strength. This is where the grace of God comes to us as good news. A popular hymn speaks of how God's grace "draws [us] near, and all that it asks it provides." All that God has required of us (i.e. perfect obedience to the law) has been accomplished and offered to us to be received by faith (another demand that is graciously given to us).

Similar to how verse one ends in Christ's humility, verse two closes with Christ's exaltation as he reigns in strength as the King of kings. This is the Christ we celebrate every Lord's Day. This is the message we proclaim every Lord's Day. This is the message of Easter. Death is swallowed up in victory! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!
