The Annotated Hymnal

"How Deep the Father's Love for Us"

March 1st marks the beginning of the Lenten season, which has traditionally been a time of preparation and repentance during which we anticipate Good Friday and Easter. While not celebrated explicitly at TFC, it is important for us to understand the significance of this season which is celebrated across other Christian denominations.

The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is at the heart of the Christian gospel, and Good Friday and Easter are two of the most significant celebrations of the Christian year. And as we carefully prepare for big events in our personal lives, such as a wedding or commencement, Lent invites us to make our hearts ready for remembering Jesus' passion and celebrating Jesus' resurrection.

The practice of a forty-day preparation period began in the Christian church during the third century. The number forty carries biblical significance based on the forty years Israel spent in the wilderness and Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness. The forty days of Lent begin on Ash Wednesday and continue through Holy Week, not counting Sundays. As a period of preparation, Lent has historically included the instruction of persons for baptism and profession of faith on Easter Sunday; the calling back of those who have become estranged from the church; and efforts by all Christians to



deepen their piety, devotion, and readiness to mark the death and resurrection of their Savior.

In a season that is often focused on what we will give up in our lives, it is important for us to remember what God gave up for us. As this hymn reminds us, God the Father gives "His only Son to make a wretch His treasure." If we are in Christ, God treasures us! Have you ever taken time to really let that sink in? As someone once said, "[God] has honeymoon affections for His people." And this is not because we are worthy of those affections. It is simply because of His deep love for His people. And this deep love extends to every part of us—not just to the facade that is on display every Sunday, but to the deepest parts of us where we cover our guilt and shame. God loves us for who we are, not who we pretend to be! This frees us to be open and honest about our sins and struggles, not having to pretend like we "have it all together."

So as we come into this time of preparation, let us remember the Father's deep love for us. Let us remember that we have a love that will not let us go, because we have a love that let the Son go in our place. Let us remember that the love that chose us before the foundation of the world is the same love that calls us, justifies us, and will keep us to the end (Romans 8:30). And let us live in light of that love for us. Let us live lives of praise and adoration. Let us live lives of confession and repentance. Let us live lives of thanksgiving and gratitude. And as we live our lives *Coram Deo*—before the face of God—let us deepen our piety and devotion for the One who is worthy of it all. That's an invitation for us all.

How deep the Father's love for us,
How vast beyond all measure,
That He should give His only Son
To make a wretch His treasure.
How great the pain of searing loss—
The Father turns His face away,
As wounds which mar the Chosen One
Bring many sons to glory.

Behold the man upon a cross,
My sin upon His shoulders;
Ashamed, I hear my mocking voice
Call out among the scoffers.
It was my sin that held Him there
Until it was accomplished;
His dying breath has brought me life—



YOBANEIDY'S COMMUNITY

Yobaneidy lives on the plains of Jardines del Sur, home to approximately 1,500 residents. Typical houses are constructed of dirt floors, brick walls and tile roofs. The primary ethnic group is Mestizo and the spoken language is Spanish.

The regional diet consists of bread, cassava, chicken and rice. Most adults in Jardines del Sur work as day laborers and earn the equivalent of \$217 per month. This community needs health centers, a sewer system, technical training centers, a police station and recreation facilities.

Your sponsorship allows the staff of Capilla Jardines del Sur Student Center to provide Yobaneidy with Bible teaching, discipleship classes, health screenings, supplemental food, health and hygiene education, indoor and outdoor games, community service opportunities, life skills training, educational assistance and mentoring programs.
